

Salisbury Forum on Health

The Salisbury Forum concludes their 2007-2008 season with **Dr. Daniel Callahan**, a Senior Fellow at the Harvard Medical School and a Senior Fellow at Yale. He will discuss **“ETHICAL ISSUES IN UNIVERSAL HEALTHCARE: ARE MEDICAL PROGRESS AND EQUAL ACCESS COMPATIBLE?”** on June 6th, 7:30 pm at The Hotchkiss School, Walker Auditorium.

Daniel Callahan, has been at the center of the bioethics discussion since the early 1960's. His trilogy of award-winning books, *Setting Limits*(1987), *What Kind of Life* (1990), *The Troubled Dream of Life* (1993) set an innovative agenda for biomedical ethics. He co-founded The Hastings Center, one of the world's major bioethics research centers, where he has concentrated on health policy and medical research policy. His work on medicine and the market examines the impact of market theory, and practice on health care systems, with a special focus on issues of equity/access and healthcare costs. Callahan is a Senior Fellow at the Harvard Medical School and a Senior Fellow at Yale. He is an elected member of the Institute of Medicine, National Academy of Science; a former member of the Director's Advisory Committee Centers for Disease Control; and a former member of the Advisory Council, Office of Scientific Integrity, U.S. Department of Health and Human Services. Dr. Callahan is the author or editor of 39 books, including *Medicine and the Market: Equity vs. Choice* (2006). He has contributed articles to numerous journals.
